

Since ancient times, humanity has sought to please God. In the story of Cain and Abel, they both endeavored to please God through their offerings. However, while Abel's sacrifice found favor with God, Cain's did not. This illustrates that there are assumptions about what pleases God and what doesn't. In Isaiah 58, we encounter a similar scenario where the people of Israel express frustration with God despite their efforts to please Him. They question why their fasting and acts of humility seem to go unnoticed by God.

However, God's response in Isaiah 58 indicates that their actions were not aligned with His expectations. He rebukes them for merely doing as they pleased and expecting Him to be pleased in return. God desires His people to live in a manner consistent with His nature, not merely to perform rituals they assume will please Him. While fasting and prayer are commendable practices, if they are not accompanied by righteous living, they are displeasing to God.

The apostle Paul echoes this sentiment in Ephesians 5:10, urging believers to discern what pleases God. This requires a diligent study of Scripture to understand His will and desires. Pleasing God is not about the outward display of spirituality but about the transformation of our hearts and actions in accordance with His Word.
