Stan Swamy, who advocated for the rights of Dalits and Adivasis in India.



Although these reformers may not have eradicated injustice entirely, they have worked tirelessly to loosen the chains that bind the oppressed. As families and members of the body of Christ, it is imperative that we instill in future generations the importance of walking in the way of the Lord, which involves doing what is just and right, as stated in Genesis 18:19. Let us also intercede in prayer for those who suffer injustice, whether within their own homes or in broader society. May God bring about righteousness and justice for all who are oppressed, across all nations.
